Maya's Tide Pool Journal

- ① At low tide, Maya and her grandfather visit a rocky shore near their home. They carry a notebook, a small ruler, and a camera. "Look carefully," Grandpa says, "because tide pools are tiny ocean neighborhoods." In one pool, Maya spots a purple sea star clinging to a wet rock. She writes the date, June 14, at the top of her page. Then she measures the pool's width and draws its round shape beside it in pencil.
- ② Grandpa explains that the water will return when the tide rises. Maya must leave each animal where she finds it, even if it looks unusual. A crab waves one claw from beneath a shell. A snail slides across a patch of green algae. "Why do the animals stay in such small pools?" Maya asks. Grandpa points toward the open water and answers, "The pools give them food, shelter, and a place to hide from predators."
- ③ Before leaving, Maya checks her notes beside the tide pool. She labels the drawing "Pool A" and adds three observations. The sea star has five arms. The water feels cool. One tiny fish darts under a ledge. Maya rereads every sentence, checking capital letters, end marks, commas, and spelling. Her careful notes will help her compare this pool with others on her next visit. What might she discover tomorrow when the tide is low again?
