A Space for Quiet Work

- ① At the student council meeting, Maya proposed a quiet study corner in the cafeteria. "Some students need a calm place during lunch," she said. Jordan replied that the idea could help students finish homework, but he worried that the corner would take away tables for friends eating together. Maya listened and wrote down his concern. She asked, "How many tables do we need at our busiest lunch?" The group agreed to collect that information before choosing a location.
- ② Then Elena, who uses a wheelchair, pointed out that any study corner needed a wide path. "A useful space must be easy for everyone to reach," she explained. Jordan built on her idea. He suggested placing the corner near the library doors, where there was already open floor space. Maya responded, "That location protects the path and leaves cafeteria tables available." She added that a sign could explain the corner's purpose, so students would know when it was meant for quiet work.
- ③ After checking the lunch schedule, the group learned that six tables were usually empty. They chose a corner beside the library doors and planned to keep a wide walkway clear. Maya summarized the decision: "We used Jordan's concern about seating and Elena's point about access. This plan gives students a quiet place without blocking others." The council decided to try the corner for two weeks. Afterward, students who used the space and students who ate nearby would share feedback before the council made a final decision.
