Building an Exhibit Label

- ① While transcribing an 1849 ship log, archivist Lena Ortiz paused at the word barque. A general dictionary listed the pronunciation as “bark” and labeled it a noun. Yet the brief definition, “a sailing vessel,” did not show why the captain described its rigging. Ortiz opened a digital maritime glossary, a specialized reference. It defined a barque as a vessel with at least three masts, square sails on the foremast and mainmast, and fore-and-aft sails on the mizzenmast. The glossary gave Ortiz the precise meaning needed for the exhibit label.
- ② A second entry stated that passengers were “held in quarantine” before landing. Ortiz checked both a historical encyclopedia and an etymological dictionary. The encyclopedia explained that port quarantine was a health measure that separated people or ships to limit disease. The etymological dictionary traced quarantine through Italian quarantina, meaning “about forty days,” from quaranta, “forty.” That origin fits the historic practice of a forty-day isolation period, but Ortiz did not define every modern quarantine as forty days. A current dictionary showed that quarantine can be a noun for the separation or a verb meaning to isolate.
- ③ Ortiz then revised a sentence about investors who ignored health warnings. Her first draft called them disinterested, but a print dictionary's usage note defined disinterested as impartial or free from self-interest. The same note reported that some speakers use it to mean uninterested, or not interested, although the meanings can confuse readers. For a public exhibit, Ortiz consulted the museum's digital style guide, a specialized reference for its publications. It recommended uninterested when the intended meaning was “not paying attention or not concerned.” She changed the sentence so its standard usage was clear.

Disinterested traditionally means impartial or free from self-interest, while she meant not interested or concerned. The museum's digital style guide recommended uninterested.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

I investigated mitosis using Merriam-Webster and OpenStax Biology 2e. Merriam-Webster identifies mitosis as a noun and gives the pronunciation “my-TOH-sis”; it traces the word to Greek mitos, meaning “thread.” OpenStax explains that mitosis is nuclear division that produces two genetically identical daughter nuclei. In a lab report, I would write, “Mitosis divides the cell's nucleus,” because that wording is more precise than saying it simply makes two new cells.

Accept equivalent wording for the four passage-based answers when it includes the correct source and information. For the open task, accept varied words and sources if the student identifies both a general and specialized reference and uses the findings accurately.
