A Garden at Dusk

- ③ Maya set the lantern on a flat rock and watched the two animals disappear. The snail glided slowly, but the hedgehog bustled through the grass like a little broom. Soon, the garden grew still again. Maya walked home under the bright moon, carrying the warm picture of the night in her mind for many days.

#	QUESTION	ANSWER
1	Which words make the leaves seem as if they can speak? What feeling do those words create?	"the leaves whispered"; they create a quiet, gentle, slightly mysterious feeling.
2	How do the words "glided slowly" and "bustled" help you picture the snail and the hedgehog?	"Glided slowly" shows the snail moving gently and slowly. "Bustled" shows the hedgehog moving in a busy, quicker way.
3	Why did the author write "scratch, scratch, scratch" instead of just saying that Maya heard a sound?	The repeated word helps the reader hear the sound and builds suspense before the hedgehog appears.
4	What phrase compares the hedgehog to something else? What picture does that phrase create?	"like a little broom"; it makes the hedgehog seem small, bristly, and moving through the grass.
