1	The baby cried because she was hungry.	LITERAL	The baby is actually crying and hungry.
2	My backpack weighs a ton.	NONLITERAL	The backpack is very heavy, but it does not truly weigh a ton.
3	Jordan has a frog in his throat, so his voice sounds scratchy.	NONLITERAL	Jordan does not have a real frog in his throat. The phrase means his voice is rough.
4	We planted seeds in the garden.	LITERAL	The class can actually plant seeds in a garden.
5	Dad told me to hold my horses and wait.	NONLITERAL	The phrase means to wait, not to hold real horses.
6	The dog wagged its tail at the door.	LITERAL	A dog can actually wag its tail.
7	Lena used a spoon to stir the soup.	LITERAL	Lena can actually stir soup with a spoon.
8	When the bell rang, the class hit the books.	NONLITERAL	The class began to study. They did not strike books.
