A Visit to the Marsh

- ① On Saturday, Maya visited the Riverbend Nature Center, which sits beside a marsh. A guide named Mr. Ortiz showed visitors a pond where frogs laid eggs in spring. He pointed to a tiny tree frog that rested on a reed. Maya watched the frog, whose bright green skin helped it blend with leaves. She wrote notes about each animal she saw.
- ② Mr. Ortiz introduced Maya to Dr. Lin, who studies local wetlands. Dr. Lin explained that wetlands clean water by trapping soil and slowing floods. She described a day when heavy rain filled the marsh. The center records water levels after storms. Dr. Lin explained the reason why this information helps scientists track changes in the marsh. Maya thanked Dr. Lin, whom she hoped to meet again during a future visit.
- ③ Before leaving, Maya visited a display about beavers, which build dams from branches and mud. The display showed a lodge, where a beaver family can rest and raise young. Maya learned that dams create ponds that offer homes for many animals. She understood the reason why the center protects the marsh. It is a place that helps people study nature and protect water.
