A Pollinator Garden

- ① Behind the playground, a sunny strip of grass could become a pollinator garden. Bees, butterflies, and hummingbirds need flowers that provide nectar and pollen. Our class could plant milkweed, purple coneflowers, and asters in this space. These flowering plants would give insects food and shelter while adding color beside the blacktop throughout the school day.
- ② First, students would loosen the soil with hand trowels and tuck young plants into small holes. Next, they would spread a thin layer of mulch to hold moisture in the ground. A nearby rain barrel could collect water for dry weeks during hot summer days. This careful plan would help the garden grow without wasting water.
- ③ During science lessons, students could observe which visitors land on each kind of flower. They could record dates, weather, and insect sightings in a shared notebook. The notes might show that different plants attract different pollinators. By caring for one small plot, our school could create a useful habitat and gather real evidence about living things.
