- ② By noon, a breeze slipped through the garden like a quiet visitor. The bean leaves danced, and the tall sunflowers nodded above Maya's head. She poured water slowly around the new seeds. The thirsty ground drank every drop. Maya smiled when the tomato plants seemed to thank her with their bright, green scent. Clouds gathered, but only a few soft raindrops fell.
- ③ Before leaving, Maya checked the soil with one finger. It felt damp, not muddy or soaked. She placed a small wooden sign beside the row: “Beans.” The garden was quiet again, except for the robin's quick chirps. Maya walked home with dirty knees and a hopeful heart. She imagined green shoots pushing upward, ready to greet the next warm day.

#	QUESTION	ANSWER
1	Which words show the sun doing something people do? What do these words suggest?	"The morning sun peeked over the fence." It suggests that the sun appeared slowly above the fence.
2	What is compared to a quiet visitor? How are they alike?	The breeze is compared to a quiet visitor. Both move through gently and quietly.
3	What does "The thirsty ground drank every drop" mean?	The dry soil absorbed all the water quickly.
4	What does damp tell you about the soil? Use muddy and soaked to explain the word's exact meaning.	Damp means slightly wet. It is less wet than muddy or soaked.
