A Garden for Pollinators

- ① On Saturday, students at Maple Street School planned a pollinator garden beside the playground. They wanted a space that would help butterflies and bees find food. The garden team chose both purple coneflowers and golden black-eyed Susans because these native flowers can provide nectar. Each group sketched a small plot and listed the tools it would need.
- ② First, the class had to decide where to place the garden beds. The site could be either near the sunny fence or along the library wall, but the wall stayed too shady. The students selected the fence. They also learned that neither plastic flowers nor painted rocks can feed pollinators, so they planned to use living plants instead.
- ③ During planting, volunteers carried water in buckets and pressed seeds into moist soil. The team would not only label each plant but also make a map of the beds. This map could help visitors identify flowers and help gardeners remember where seeds were planted. By summer, the garden may offer both a resting place for insects and a colorful view for people.
