1	The rabbit was wary, staying close to its burrow when the hawk flew overhead.	CONTEXT	Staying close to the burrow when danger is near shows that wary means cautious or careful.
2	The twins were exhausted, so they fell asleep before dinner.	CONTEXT	Falling asleep early gives a clear clue that exhausted means very tired.
3	The geography book says that Florida is a peninsula.	REFERENCE	The sentence does not explain what peninsula means.
4	The museum label names the object an astrolabe.	REFERENCE	The sentence gives no details about what an astrolabe is.
5	The sour lemon made Jada pucker and squint.	CONTEXT	Puckering and squinting show the effect of the sour lemon.
6	The history book describes a group called the Phoenicians.	REFERENCE	The sentence does not tell who the Phoenicians were.
7	A narrow path wound through the forest, twisting between tall trees.	CONTEXT	Twisting between trees shows that wound means curved or turned.
8	The snowdrift was enormous, towering over the small fence.	CONTEXT	Towering over a fence shows that enormous means very large.

Accept any explanation that names the deciding feature from the rule box for the chosen item.

PART 3 • MAKE YOUR OWN (SAMPLE ANSWERS)

- **CONTEXT:** The icy path was slippery, so Noor walked slowly and held the rail.
- **REFERENCE:** The textbook names a tool called a hygrometer.

Challenge: The hikers crossed a barren plain under the hot sun. I think barren may mean dry or empty, and I would use a dictionary to confirm it.

Accept CONTEXT when students identify nearby details that reveal the word's meaning. For REFERENCE, students should explain that the sentence lacks enough information and name an appropriate source, such as a dictionary or glossary.
