Cleanup at Willow Creek

- ① On Saturday, Maya joined a park cleanup beside Willow Creek. The trail was narrow, not wide, so volunteers walked in a single line. Maya carried a small sack, or bag, for litter, while Mr. Chen carried a large bag. When a light rain began, everyone moved quickly, but no one rushed past slippery stones near the water's edge.
- ② At a bend in the creek, Maya spotted a turtle resting on the muddy bank. She knew a bank can also be a place where people keep money. Later, the group sat on a wooden bench to eat lunch. A nearby sign asked visitors not to feed the ducks, which stayed quiet until crumbs fell.
- ③ Before leaving, volunteers counted the trash they had collected. The pile looked messy at first, yet the sorting table soon made it orderly. Maya felt proud, not ashamed, of the team's careful work. She wrote that protecting a creek is important because clean water helps plants, animals, and people in the area stay healthy and safe.
