A Night at the Hatchery

- ① Before sunrise, workers at a sea turtle hatchery check the sand above each nest. A small flag marks the place where eggs rest below the surface. Because hatchlings usually emerge at night, the team watches for tiny tracks leading toward the water. The work is careful, not hurried. By recording the date, nest location, and number of tracks, workers can learn which beaches give young turtles the safest start for their first journey to sea.
- ② At dusk, the beach changes. Waves erase many tracks, while moonlight helps the workers spot fresh ones. If a hatchling has become tangled in a piece of plastic, a trained worker removes the trash and carries the turtle to the edge of the surf. Then the worker steps back. The hatchling must crawl across the sand on its own, using the same natural signals that guide other young turtles along the shore toward the ocean.
- ③ Although hatcheries can protect nests, they cannot solve every danger. Bright lights from buildings may draw hatchlings away from the ocean, and loose plastic can block their path. For this reason, some coastal towns ask residents to shield outdoor lights during nesting season and carry reusable bags to the beach. Small choices matter. When people leave the shore darker and cleaner, more hatchlings have a chance to begin their lives in the sea each year.

#	QUESTION	ANSWER
1	How does beginning the first sentence with "Before sunrise" help the reader?	It immediately tells when the workers begin checking the nests.
2	Which sentence begins with an if clause? What action does that sentence describe?	"If a hatchling has become tangled in a piece of plastic..." It describes a trained worker removing the trash and carrying the turtle to the edge of the surf.
3	Why might the writer use the short sentence "Then the worker steps back" after a longer sentence?	The short sentence emphasizes the worker's pause and makes clear that the hatchling must continue on its own.
4	How do the openings "Although," "For this reason," and "When" organize ideas in the last paragraph?	"Although" introduces a limit, "For this reason" introduces a response, and "When" introduces the result of people's choices.
