Notes from the Otter Exhibit

- ① On a clear autumn morning, a student team visited the Smithsonian’s National Zoo in Washington, D.C. Their goal was simple: observe how animal-care staff prepare food for Asian small-clawed otters. At the kitchen window, Maya recorded fish, clams, and chopped vegetables on her clipboard. “The otters need variety,” explained keeper Luis Hernandez. He measured each portion carefully, because an animal’s diet affects its energy, growth, and health. The group watched quietly, asked thoughtful questions, and compared notes before leaving.
- ② Later, the team entered the otters’ habitat, where water rushed over smooth rocks. Hernandez pointed to a wooden den and said, “That space gives the animals a private place to rest.” One otter floated on its back; another searched beneath a log. Maya noticed that the keepers used gloves, buckets, and disinfectant to keep work areas clean. The zoo’s veterinary team also checks the otters regularly. During an exam, veterinarians may listen to an otter’s heart, examine its teeth, and record its weight.
- ③ Before the visit ended, the class made a plan for its report. Jordan would sketch the habitat, Priya would organize the observations, and Maya would check the facts. Their teacher reminded them to spell scientific words correctly, especially veterinarian and disinfectant. The report would include a map, a data table, and a short conclusion. Back at school, the students revised every sentence. They checked names, quotation marks, commas, and end marks so readers could understand the visit clearly.
