Moon-Viewing Night

- ① At the Harbor Science Club, students plan a public moon-viewing night. The club meets in the library each Thursday, and members choose the courtyard because it has an open view of the eastern sky. Before sunset, volunteers set up telescopes, red-light flashlights, and a table of moon maps. The coordinator checks the weather forecast and posts updates online. Families arrive after dinner, then club members explain how craters formed when space rocks struck the Moon long ago.
- ② On the afternoon of the event, the coordinator gives clear directions: "Place the telescope legs on level ground, and keep the lenses covered until twilight." She also asks, "Will clouds block our view tonight?" A student studies the forecast, while another tests the battery pack. If the sky stayed clear, the club would share a live telescope image on a screen. If rain began, visitors would move indoors to watch a NASA video about lunar exploration.
- ③ Club leaders want the evening to feel welcoming, so they make a request to the principal. They write, "We suggest that every visitor use a red flashlight near the telescopes." Red light helps people keep their night vision, which makes dim objects easier to see. The principal replies, "It is essential that the courtyard remain quiet during the telescope demonstration." A calm space helps speakers answer questions and helps observers focus on the Moon's details.
