Quoting a Moon Speech

- ① When historians quote a long speech, they sometimes leave out words that are not needed for the point. An ellipsis, three spaced dots, shows where material has been omitted. The dots do not mean that a speaker paused or became uncertain. They tell readers that the writer has shortened a source. A careful writer keeps the source's meaning intact and does not use an ellipsis to hide words that would reverse or distort the speaker's idea.
- ② On September 12, 1962, President John F. Kennedy spoke at Rice University about the United States space program. He said, "We choose to go to the Moon in this decade and do the other things, not because they are easy, but because they are hard." A report could quote the key idea this way: "We choose to go to the Moon ... because they are hard." The ellipsis replaces the middle words, but the shortened quotation still shows that Kennedy described a difficult goal.
- ③ Ellipses should not remove words that change a statement's message. For example, Kennedy also explained that space exploration would continue "whether we join in it or not." Writing only "space exploration would continue ... not" would create a confusing and misleading quotation. Instead, writers can use an ellipsis when the words on both sides still connect clearly. In a caption about the speech, a writer might quote, "We choose to go to the Moon ... because they are hard."
