Labels for Lost Objects

- ① At Harbor City Museum, conservator Lena Ruiz prepared a label for a bronze compass recovered from a shipwreck. Her first draft said the metal had changed color because of corrosion. She wanted a more exact word, so she checked a specialized conservation glossary. It defined patina as a thin surface layer that forms on some metals through chemical reactions. The glossary helped Lena explain that the compass's green coating was patina, not simply dirt. She wrote the word in her notes and recorded the glossary as her source.
- ② Next, Lena needed to describe the damage near the compass's iron needle. A general dictionary listed corroded as an adjective and gave its pronunciation as kuh-ROH-did. The entry explained that corroded means damaged or eaten away gradually by a chemical process. Lena used the adjective in her label: "The corroded needle cannot turn freely." Checking the dictionary kept her from using corroded as a noun or saying the word incorrectly. She also noted the pronunciation for the audio guide.
- ③ Finally, Lena revised a sentence about the wooden storage box. She had written that its painted design was old, but old did not tell visitors what had happened. In a thesaurus, she compared faded, worn, and weathered. A dictionary entry clarified that faded describes color that has lost brightness. Because the blue paint looked pale after years of light exposure, Lena chose faded. She avoided weathered, which often describes change caused by outdoor conditions. The final label gave visitors a precise picture of the box's condition.
