SEMICOLON WORKS

The semicolon correctly joins two closely related independent clauses. Each side can stand as a complete sentence.

The lantern dimmed; nevertheless, the hikers continued along the ridge.

SEMICOLON NEEDS REPAIR

The semicolon does not correctly link two independent clauses. One side may be a phrase or dependent clause, or a coordinating conjunction may follow the semicolon.

Across the frozen pond; a fox crossed quietly.
