#	ITEM	CATEGORY	WHY
1	After hiking for hours, Lena was [famished] and ate two sandwiches.	CONTEXT	Eating two sandwiches after hours of hiking shows that famished means very hungry.
2	The toddler was [jubilant], clapping and laughing at the parade.	CONTEXT	Clapping and laughing provide clues that jubilant means very joyful.
3	The committee will [convene] on Thursday.	RESEARCH	The sentence gives a time but does not explain what convene means.
4	The old bridge was [precarious], swaying over the river in the wind.	CONTEXT	Swaying in the wind suggests precarious means unstable or dangerous.
5	The poem uses [anaphora] in its second stanza.	RESEARCH	The sentence identifies where anaphora appears but does not define the literary term.
6	The court issued a [writ].	RESEARCH	The legal setting does not provide enough information to determine the precise meaning of writ.
7	Because the instructions were [ambiguous], three students assembled the model differently.	CONTEXT	Different assemblies suggest that ambiguous means unclear or open to more than one meaning.
8	The novel's [protagonist] faces a moral dilemma.	RESEARCH	The sentence does not explain the literary role of a protagonist.

PART 3 • MAKE YOUR OWN (SAMPLE ANSWERS)

- **CONTEXT:** The glassy pond was [placid], with no ripples or waves.
- **RESEARCH:** The historian examined the [codex].

Challenge: After the storm, the volunteers cleared the fallen branches from the road.

Sort key: CONTEXT for 1, 2, 4, and 7; RESEARCH for 3, 5, 6, and 8. For the explanation task, accept answers that identify useful context clues or explain that the sentence lacks a definition-level clue.
