Reading a Manuscript Record

- ① At the University of Manchester's John Rylands Library, conservators digitize fragile manuscripts so researchers can inspect them without handling every page. Before photographing a fifteenth-century book of prayers, a conservator recorded its provenance. The book had passed from a monastery to a private collector and then to the library, with dates and sale records tracing each transfer. From these details, a reader might infer that provenance concerns where an object has been and who has owned it. The record protects the book's history as carefully as its parchment. After making that preliminary inference, a library database defines provenance as the documented history of an object's ownership.
- ② On one leaf, faint marginalia appeared beside a painted initial. The tiny handwritten notes were not part of the prayer itself. One note corrected a misspelled Latin word, and another pointed toward a related passage. A reader could first decide that marginalia means writing added around the main text. To check that inference, the conservator's catalog describes the marks as "notes or drawings written in the margins of a book or manuscript." The fuller definition confirms the idea and adds that drawings can count as marginalia.
- ③ Digitization also revealed a problem with the book's collation. Several sheets had been bound in the wrong order, so a prayer that began on one page continued many leaves later. This evidence suggests that collation has to do with arranging a book's folded sheets and pages. The library's glossary verifies the inference: in book studies, collation is a description of how a volume's leaves or gatherings are arranged. Comparing the clue, the glossary, and the misplaced sheets lets a reader revise a vague guess into a precise meaning.
