Life in a Tide Pool

- ① At low tide, the ocean pulls back from the shore. Small pools of seawater stay among the rocks. These tide pools are tiny homes for animals that can live in wet, salty places.
- ② When you look closely, you may see a sea star clinging to a rock. A sea star uses many small tube feet to hold on. It must stay wet, so it hides under rocks or seaweed.
- ③ Crabs also scuttle through the pools. They may tuck into cracks when a bird flies overhead. As the tide returns, waves cover the rocks again. The animals have food, water, and safe places to rest.
