The Lighthouse Signal

- ③ Mara watched the light turn, pause, and turn again. The storm moved closer, yet the lighthouse stood firm. Its beam flashed over the waves like a steady hand pointing home. Mara loosened her grip on the rail. "I think the ships will find their way," she said. Grandpa smiled. Below them, the harbor lights winked through the rain.
