Ratifying the Nineteenth Amendment

- ① In 1919, after decades of campaigning for women's voting rights, Congress proposed the Nineteenth Amendment. Both the House and Senate approved its wording by the required two-thirds vote. Congress then sent the proposed amendment to the states. At that time, the Constitution required approval from three-fourths of the states before an amendment could become part of the Constitution. With forty-eight states, that meant thirty-six state legislatures had to ratify it. The proposal did not yet change voting laws.
- ② When a state legislature voted to ratify the amendment, that state's approval added one to the national total. State officials sent an official record of the action to the federal government. Some legislatures rejected the amendment or delayed a vote. Those actions did not add to the thirty-six-state requirement. Supporters therefore watched the running count and focused on states where lawmakers might still vote yes. A later ratification, however, could add that state to the count.
- ③ By August 1920, thirty-five states had ratified. Tennessee's legislature then considered the amendment. On August 18, it voted to ratify, making Tennessee the thirty-sixth state needed. After federal officials received and checked the ratification records, Secretary of State Bainbridge Colby issued a proclamation on August 26. The proclamation certified that the Nineteenth Amendment was part of the Constitution. It barred denying citizens the right to vote on account of sex. The process was complete nationally.
