The Franklin Expedition

- ① In 1845, British naval officer Sir John Franklin sailed from England with 128 other men aboard HMS Erebus and HMS Terror. The expedition hoped to complete the Northwest Passage, a sea route through the Canadian Arctic. After entering Lancaster Sound, the ships were seen by European whalers only once, in July 1845. No crew member returned. Searchers later found a note at Victory Point on King William Island. It states that Franklin died on June 11, 1847, and that the surviving crew left the icebound ships on April 22, 1848.
- ② The note does not explain why the men left or where they intended to go. During the 1860s, American explorer Charles Francis Hall recorded Inuit testimony about qallunaat, or outsiders, traveling south and pulling a boat across the ice. Some witnesses described hungry men and a large group that later died near the mainland. Decades afterward, investigators found scattered artifacts and human remains in the region. Cut marks on some bones provide evidence that some survivors may have processed human bodies for food. Yet the accounts were recorded years after the events, and the remains cannot identify every person or reconstruct each decision.
- ③ Modern searches located Erebus in 2014 and Terror in 2016, south of King William Island. Underwater images show that Terror rests upright in a sheltered bay, while Erebus lies in shallower water and is more damaged. These discoveries confirm that the ships ended in different places, although they do not reveal when or why they separated. Archaeologists have recovered objects from Erebus, including personal items and equipment. A ship's log or a clear final message could clarify the crew's movements, but none has been recovered from the wrecks. The expedition's final months therefore remain partly uncertain.

Cut marks on bones support the claim that some survivors may have processed human bodies for food. The remains cannot identify every person or explain each person's actions.

The crew's intended destination remains uncertain because the note does not say where they planned to go. The timing and reason for the ships' separation are also uncertain because no final log or clear message has been recovered.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

After Franklin died, the surviving crew abandoned the icebound ships in April 1848, according to the Victory Point note in paragraph 1. Their decision likely reflected a crisis because Inuit witnesses described hungry men traveling south and later dying near the mainland in paragraph 2. Cut marks on bones further suggest that at least some survivors faced extreme shortages, although they cannot explain every individual's actions. The evidence does not establish the crew's intended destination or why the ships ended in different locations, since no final log or message has been recovered.

Accept reasonable inferences that are supported by specific passage details and clearly identified as inferences rather than facts. Students should name a genuine uncertainty and explain why the available evidence does not resolve it.
