How Beavers Change a Stream

- ① Beavers are often called nature's engineers because they change the places where they live. Using their large front teeth, they cut branches and carry mud, stones, and sticks to a stream. These materials can form a dam, a wall that slows the moving water. Behind the dam, water spreads out and creates a pond nearby.
- ② The new pond can help many living things. Fish may find calmer water, and frogs can lay eggs near its edges. Water birds may rest or search for food there. The pond also holds water after rain, so less water may rush downstream at once. However, a dam can flood land and change the habitat of plants that need dry ground.
- ③ Beavers also build lodges, where they rest and raise their young. A lodge may be made of branches and mud, often with an underwater entrance. This entrance can make it harder for some predators to get inside. In winter, beavers stay in the lodge and eat food they stored nearby. By building dams and lodges, beavers shape both their own homes and the wider habitat.

1	What is the central idea of the whole text?	Beavers build dams and lodges that make homes for themselves and change the surrounding habitat.
2	How does paragraph 2 add to the information in paragraph 1?	Paragraph 1 explains that a dam creates a pond. Paragraph 2 explains how that pond can help animals, hold rainwater, and flood dry land.
3	What does the word "habitat" mean in paragraph 2? Use details from the paragraph to help you.	Habitat means the place where a living thing lives. The paragraph explains that flooding can change the place where plants that need dry ground live.
4	Why does the author include information about the lodge's underwater entrance?	The author includes it to explain how a lodge can help protect beavers from some predators.

A beaver builds a dam from branches, mud, stones, and sticks, slowing a stream and creating a pond. The pond can give fish and frogs places to live, but it can also flood dry land. Beavers use lodges with underwater entrances for shelter, so their building changes both a home and the surrounding habitat.
