A Garden for Maple Grove

- ① At Maple Grove School, a bare corner near the playground becomes muddy after rain. The student garden club suggests turning this space into a native flower garden. Native plants are plants that grow naturally in an area. The club believes the garden would help local wildlife and make the schoolyard easier to care for. They give several reasons and facts to support their plan.
- ② First, the club says native flowers can provide nectar and seeds for bees, butterflies, and birds. For example, purple coneflowers make nectar, and their seed heads can feed birds in colder months. This evidence supports the club's point that the garden could give animals food. A garden with more kinds of plants may also attract more kinds of pollinators, which help many flowering plants reproduce.
- ③ Second, native plants usually need less extra water once their roots are established, because they are suited to local weather. The club notes that this could save time for the adults who water the grounds. Native gardens can still need weeding and watering during dry periods, so the club does not claim that the garden would take no work. These details make the plan sound realistic.
