### The Tern's Long Flight

- ① Each year, an Arctic tern begins one of the longest migrations made by any animal. The bird breeds during the northern summer near Arctic coasts, then flies south as days shorten. Many terns travel to waters near Antarctica, where it is summer. A round trip can cover about 40,000 kilometers, although routes differ. Instead of crossing land in a straight line, terns often follow ocean winds and currents. Their journey gives them more daylight than almost any other creature receives.
- ② Scientists have learned about these flights by attaching tiny tracking devices to some birds. The devices record locations, allowing researchers to map a tern's path after it returns. Maps show that a tern may zigzag across the Atlantic Ocean rather than fly directly south. This route can seem longer, but it may lead the bird to areas with favorable winds or plentiful food. Terns eat small fish and other sea animals, so stopping where food is available helps them replace energy used during flight.
- ③ Migration is risky. Storms can push a tern off course, and young birds must learn to find feeding places over a huge ocean. Climate change may also alter winds, water temperatures, and the location of fish. Even so, Arctic terns have survived by using traits suited to long travel. Their narrow wings help them glide, and their bodies are light. By moving between two polar summers, the birds can find extended periods of light for hunting and raising chicks.

**PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)**

Arctic terns travel between Arctic breeding coasts and Antarctic waters, a trip that can stretch about 40,000 kilometers. Tracking maps reveal that they may take indirect routes to reach winds and feeding areas. Although storms and changing fish locations create problems, light bodies and narrow wings help the birds travel efficiently.
