Growing a Reef

- ① At dawn, marine biologist Leila Torres checks a coral nursery beneath the waves. The nursery is not a building. It is a set of underwater frames that hold small pieces of living coral. These pieces, called fragments, are attached to the frames with epoxy, a waterproof glue. The frames keep the fragments off the sandy bottom, where they could be buried. In clear water, the nursery looks like a tiny forest growing in a blue, moving sky.
- ② Coral animals build hard skeletons from calcium carbonate, a mineral also found in limestone. When the water becomes too warm for too long, corals may expel the algae living inside their tissues. This event is called bleaching. The coral does not always die immediately, but it loses a major food source and its bright color. A bleached reef can appear ghostly, an unsettling sight for divers. If cooler conditions return soon, some corals can take in algae again and recover.
- ③ To restore a damaged reef, divers choose healthy fragments from several parent colonies. Using a process called outplanting, they fasten the fragments to bare rock with epoxy. The work is slow because each fragment must be placed where sunlight and water flow can reach it. A restored reef may become a shelter for fish, crabs, and other animals. Still, the reef's future hangs in the balance if pollution and unusually warm water continue. Restoration helps, but it cannot solve every problem alone.
