A Case for Solar Canopies

- ① At our school, the parking lot bakes in the afternoon, and students cross hot pavement after activities. I support adding solar canopies above part of the lot. These structures hold solar panels overhead while leaving space below for cars. Panels turn sunlight into electricity, and the canopies would also create shade. Our school should study the project now, not treat it as a faraway dream. A shaded parking area could make pickup more comfortable while helping the school produce some of its own power.
- ② Some neighbors may say the money should go toward more classroom supplies. That concern deserves a careful budget, especially because installing canopies can cost a lot at first. However, choosing supplies or solar power is not always an either-or decision. Grants, community partnerships, and a phased plan could lower the cost. Others suggest planting trees instead. Trees are valuable, but young trees take years to grow large enough for broad shade, and they do not generate electricity. For these reasons, I see canopies as a practical long-term investment.
- ③ Critics might worry that solar panels will look unattractive or will need maintenance. I understand that equipment must be inspected and repaired over time. Still, the appearance concern should not decide the whole issue. Canopies can be designed to match school colors, and maintenance is a normal part of caring for any school property. The bigger question is whether the canopies provide useful shade and electricity over many years. By comparing costs, energy savings, and student comfort, the school can make a responsible choice.

3	How does the author distinguish solar canopies from the idea of planting trees instead?	The author says trees are valuable, but young trees need years to provide broad shade and do not generate electricity.
4	Before disagreeing with concerns about appearance and maintenance, what does the author do? How does the author explain why the project should still be considered?	The author acknowledges that equipment needs inspection and repair. Then the author argues that appearance is not the whole issue because canopies can match school colors and could provide shade and electricity for years.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

I support installing a water-bottle filling station near the gym. Some people may prefer buying bottled water for events because it seems simpler. However, a filling station lets students refill reusable bottles during practices, so the school would need fewer single-use bottles. Although the station would cost money to install, its convenience and reduced bottle use make it the better choice.
