Jerrie Mock's Global Flight

- ① On March 19, 1964, Jerrie Mock lifted off from Columbus, Ohio, in a small Cessna 180 called the Spirit of Columbus. Her goal was to become the first woman to fly solo around the world. Mock carried maps, a radio, survival gear, and extra fuel tanks. During the journey, she crossed the Atlantic Ocean, stopped in North Africa and Asia, and flew over the Pacific. The flight drew attention because few women had attempted a solo trip of that size.
- ② Mock's route was not smooth. Weather reports, fuel needs, and flight plans shaped when she could leave each stop. On long stretches over water, careful navigation mattered because there were few places to land if trouble occurred. Mock used maps, instruments, and radio messages to track her route. When conditions changed, she adjusted her schedule instead of abandoning the flight. These practical decisions helped her keep moving across several continents and oceans during her nearly monthlong journey.
- ③ On April 17, 1964, Mock landed back in Columbus after traveling about 22,860 miles in 29 days. The trip made Mock the first woman to complete a solo flight around the world. She later wrote about the journey and spoke to students about aviation. Her record did not remove every barrier for women pilots, but it showed that a woman could complete a demanding international flight alone.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Mock's journey may have expanded ideas about who could succeed in aviation. The passage says she was the "first woman to complete a solo flight around the world," which made her achievement historically important. It also says her record showed that a woman could complete a demanding international flight alone, so her example could challenge limits placed on women pilots.

Accept accurate quotations or paraphrases of the passage when students clearly connect evidence to a claim or inference. For the open response, accept reasonable claims about Mock's influence if students cite two relevant details and explain both connections.
