Why Wetlands Matter

- ① Before many cities built storm drains, wetlands slowed rainwater naturally. A wetland is land where water covers the soil for part or all of the year. Its grasses, reeds, and muddy ground act like a sponge during a storm. Instead of racing straight into a river, some water spreads across the wetland and seeps into the soil. This slowing effect can reduce flooding downstream. However, wetlands cannot stop every flood, especially when rain falls faster than the ground can absorb it.
- ② Wetlands also improve water quality, but their role depends on what enters them. As water moves slowly through wetland plants and soil, some particles settle out. Plant roots and tiny organisms can take up or change certain pollutants before the water reaches a stream. This process does not make all polluted water safe to drink. Instead, it shows why protecting a wetland can help a whole watershed, the land area that drains to one body of water. A damaged wetland may lose some of these filtering abilities.
- ③ Because wetlands provide several services, communities sometimes restore ones that have been drained or filled. Restoration crews may remove barriers that block water, reshape channels, or plant native vegetation. These actions aim to bring back conditions that support wetland functions, rather than creating a perfect copy of the past. The earlier examples of slowing water and filtering it explain the purpose of this work. Still, restoration takes time, and results vary with rainfall, soil, and the surrounding land. A restored wetland is one tool among many for managing water.

3	In Paragraph 2, why does the author include the sentence "This process does not make all polluted water safe to drink"?	It limits the previous explanation so readers do not assume that wetlands remove all pollution or make water safe to drink.
4	How do the fourth, fifth, and sixth sentences of Paragraph 3 work together to shape the paragraph's conclusion?	The fourth sentence connects restoration to wetlands' earlier-described functions, the fifth adds limits and conditions, and the sixth concludes that restoration is only one water-management tool.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Paragraph 3 develops the idea that restoring wetlands can support useful water-related functions. Its second sentence gives concrete examples of actions restoration crews may take. Its fourth sentence connects those actions to the earlier discussion of slowing and filtering water. The final sentence limits the idea by explaining that restoration is only one water-management tool.
