Tia's Kite Song

- ① On Tuesday, Tia takes her red kite to the park. The wind wakes, then whispers through the grass. Tia runs up the hill. “Fly, little kite, fly!” she calls. The kite lifts high in the bright blue sky.
- ② Clouds drift by, slow and white. The kite dips low, then rises high. “Fly, little kite, fly!” Tia calls again. She holds the string tight. The wind and kite pull, tug, and dance above the hill.
- ③ At sunset, Tia walks home with her kite. It did not stay in the sky, but it had its turn to fly. “Fly, little kite, fly!” Tia sings. Her happy kite ride is over.

- 1 Which line repeats three times? How does repeating it help you know what Tia wants the kite to do?

- 2 Which two words rhyme in the last paragraph? How does their rhyme make the ending sound?

- 3 Find the three words in the first paragraph that begin with the /w/ sound. How do these words help describe the wind?

Write four lines about an animal. Repeat one line twice, use two rhyming words, and use three words in a row that begin with the same sound.

PART 2 • ANSWERS

#	QUESTION	ANSWER
1	Which line repeats three times? How does repeating it help you know what Tia wants the kite to do?	"Fly, little kite, fly!" It shows that Tia wants her kite to fly.
2	Which two words rhyme in the last paragraph? How does their rhyme make the ending sound?	Sky and fly rhyme. They make the ending sound songlike and connect the kite with flying.
3	Find the three words in the first paragraph that begin with the /w/ sound. How do these words help describe the wind?	Wind, wakes, and whispers. Their repeated /w/ sound makes the wind seem soft and whispery.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Swift squirrels scoot by. "Run, little squirrel, run!" They leap up high into the sky. "Run, little squirrel, run!"

Accept answers that identify the repeated line, sky and fly, and wind, wakes, and whispers. For meaning questions, accept reasonable statements that connect repeated sounds or lines to a songlike rhythm and to Tia's wish for the kite to fly.
