The Library Falcons

- ① Each spring, a pair of peregrine falcons returns to a nest box high on the Riverton Library. The box sits near the roof, where the birds can watch the streets below. Peregrines do not build twig nests. Instead, the adults scrape a shallow dip in the gravel and lay their eggs there. Library workers set up a camera so visitors can watch without climbing to the roof.
- ② One afternoon, dark clouds rolled over the city. The adult falcons stood close over their three chicks, spreading their wings like umbrellas. Rain tapped the camera cover, and the streets below looked shiny. Even after the rain stopped, one adult remained at the nest while the other flew away. Soon, that bird returned carrying a small pigeon for the chicks.
- ③ At noon, Maya, a library volunteer, checked the camera screen in the lobby. She wrote that the chicks had grown new gray feathers and were stretching their wings. She also saw an adult tear pieces from food and offer them to the chicks. Maya planned to post her notes beside the screen, because several children had been asking how the young falcons were changing.

3	What can you infer the adult falcons were doing when they spread their wings over the chicks? Give two clues that support your inference.	They were protecting the chicks from rain. Clues include the dark clouds and rain, plus the adults standing close over the chicks with wings spread.
4	Why might Maya post her notes beside the camera screen? Use a detail from the passage to support your inference.	She wants to help children learn about the chicks because several children had been asking how the young falcons were changing.
