Two Ways to Grow

- ① Text A, "The Last Seedling," is a realistic story. Maya carried a small oak seedling to an open corner of the community garden beside her apartment building. The garden had become dusty after workers cleared broken fences and weeds. Her neighbor Mr. Chen said one tree would not shade the block. Maya looked at the hot sidewalk, where children hurried indoors after school. She placed the seedling near a rain gutter and filled a bottle at home. Each afternoon, she returned to give the roots water.
- ② By Saturday, Maya had invited friends to help. They gathered fallen leaves from the garden paths and spread them around the tree to hold moisture in the soil. Mr. Chen watched from his porch, then brought out a bucket and a packet of wildflower seeds. Other neighbors added a bench and a sign asking people not to step on the roots. Months later, the oak was still small, but its leaves made a patch of shade. Mr. Chen began planning where a second tree could grow.
- ③ Text B, "One Window Garden," is a poem. On the third floor, Lena sets three cups with holes on a sill. In each cup, a bean waits under dark, damp soil. She checks them before breakfast. A green hook lifts toward the glass. Soon, a neighbor downstairs waves at the tiny leaves from the bus stop. Lena cannot cool the whole street, but she can tend this bright corner. When she shares one sprout with her brother, two windows hold green.

#	QUESTION	ANSWER
1	What theme is developed in both Text A and Text B? Support your answer with one detail from each text.	Both texts show that caring for growing plants can improve a shared place. Maya and her neighbors grow a tree that makes shade, while Lena tends beans that bring green to two windows.
2	How are Maya's actions different from Lena's actions? Explain how each character cares for plants.	Maya invites friends and neighbors to help care for a community tree. Lena cares for bean plants herself and shares a sprout with her brother.
3	How does the realistic-story form in Text A develop the idea differently from the poem form in Text B?	Text A uses events over time and several characters to show a community effort. Text B uses short lines and images, such as the green hook and bright corner, to focus on Lena's small act of care.
4	How does each text show an effect beyond the main character? Give one detail from each text.	In Text A, neighbors join the work and Mr. Chen plans another tree. In Text B, a neighbor notices the leaves and Lena's brother receives a sprout.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

After the storm, Inez and her uncle collected plastic bottles from the creek behind the library. They asked shoppers to use the new recycling bin. Rain taps the clean stones. A heron returns to the creek. Both texts show that protecting a shared place takes action, but the story shows people working while the poem uses a nature image to show the result.

Accept any reasonable shared theme that is supported by details from both texts. For comparison responses, require a detail from each form and a clear explanation of how the story and poem use different approaches.
