Inside an Archaeological Catalog

- ① An archaeological museum does not treat every recovered item as an isolated treasure. Its catalog begins with the collection, a broad group of materials from one project or institution. Within a collection, records are separated by site, such as a river settlement or hillside cemetery. Each site is divided into excavation units, such as square grids. Each unit can contain smaller contexts, which are distinct deposits or features. A context might be a hearth, a trash pit, or a single soil layer. This descending arrangement preserves an artifact's location and its relationship to nearby evidence, even after the objects leave the ground.
- ② At the lowest catalog level, individual artifacts receive unique numbers. The number links an object to its context, excavation unit, site, and collection. Curators then add a second set of categories that describes what the object is, rather than where it was found. They may classify it by material, including ceramic, stone, metal, or bone, and then by object type. A ceramic fragment, for example, might be placed in the ceramic category and identified more narrowly as part of a storage jar. These descriptive categories cross the location hierarchy instead of replacing it.
- ③ This two-part structure lets researchers ask different questions without losing evidence. A scholar studying trade can gather metal objects from several sites through the material category. Another researcher can start with one hearth and examine every object linked to that context through the location hierarchy. Because each artifact belongs to both systems, a search for ceramic does not erase the fact that a piece came from a particular layer. The catalog therefore moves from broad groups to increasingly specific locations, while its descriptive categories sort objects by shared physical features.

Source hierarchy: District media archive > Northview High School > 2026 Science Fair > Robotics Demonstration > Photo 07.
Descriptive categories: image type, close-up; subject, robot arm. The source hierarchy shows where Photo 07 belongs among increasingly specific groups. The descriptive categories let users find close-up robot images from different events without removing each image from its source path.
