The Peregrine Falcon's Recovery

- ① By the 1960s, peregrine falcons had disappeared from much of the eastern United States. The pesticide DDT built up in the birds' bodies after they ate contaminated prey. It caused females to lay eggs with shells so thin that many broke during incubation. In 1970, the peregrine was listed as endangered in the United States. Scientists, wildlife agencies, and volunteers began tracking nests and collecting birds for captive breeding programs. They hoped to rebuild populations where the species had vanished.
- ② Captive breeding centers paired adult falcons and raised chicks until they were strong enough to live outdoors. Starting in the 1970s, workers released young peregrines from towers, cliffs, and city buildings. These sites resembled the high places where the birds naturally nest. At the same time, the United States banned most uses of DDT in 1972. As DDT levels fell and released birds survived, peregrines began nesting successfully in areas that had been empty for decades.
- ③ Today, peregrines nest on skyscrapers, bridges, cliffs, and other tall structures across many parts of the country. Their return led the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to remove the species from the federal endangered list in 1999. However, recovery does not mean every danger is gone. Falcons can still be harmed by habitat changes, collisions with buildings, and certain chemicals. Monitoring nests helps researchers notice problems and protect places that support breeding pairs in urban and natural areas.

Peregrine falcons disappeared from much of the eastern United States because DDT caused thin eggshells. After DDT was mostly banned, breeding centers raised chicks and workers released young birds. Nesting increased, and the species left the federal endangered list in 1999. Scientists still monitor falcons because buildings, habitat changes, and chemicals can cause problems.
