Ms. Lee's Garden Talk

- ① Ms. Lee spoke to the class about the new school garden. "We will grow lettuce, beans, and sunflowers in raised beds," she said. "Raised beds are boxes filled with soil above the ground."
- ② She explained that the class will add compost to the soil. Compost is made from old leaves and food scraps that break down. It helps the soil hold water and gives plants nutrients to grow.
- ③ "Each team will visit the garden twice each week," Ms. Lee said. "One team will water, while another team will pull weeds. We will also look for worms because worms make tunnels that let air reach plant roots."
