Mina's Frog Story

- ① Mina recorded a short story about finding a tiny frog after rain. She spoke slowly and made her voice quiet when the frog hid under a leaf. At the end, she used a cheerful voice when the frog hopped away.
- ② Next, Mina drew three pictures for listeners to see. The first picture showed dark clouds and puddles. The second showed the small frog under a green leaf. The last picture showed sunshine, helping people understand why Mina sounded happy.
- ③ Before sharing her recording, Mina numbered her pictures 1, 2, and 3. She pointed to each picture as the story played. Her pictures and voice helped listeners follow the events and feel the change from rainy to sunny.

3	What did Mina do with her pictures to help listeners follow the events?	She numbered the pictures 1, 2, and 3 and pointed to each one as the story played.

Recording: Read sentence 2 in a worried voice and sentence 3 in a happy voice. Drawings: 1. A red mitten falling near the slide. 2. Me looking under the slide. 3. My friend holding the mitten by the fence.
