A Later Start-Time Proposal

- ① The school board should consider moving the high school start time from 7:25 a.m. to 8:30 a.m. This proposal responds to evidence about adolescent sleep patterns rather than to personal preference. The American Academy of Pediatrics has recommended that middle and high schools begin at 8:30 a.m. or later to support student health, safety, and academic performance. A later schedule would not guarantee higher grades for every student; however, it would align the school day more closely with research indicating that many teenagers experience a biological shift toward later sleep and wake times.
- ② Implementation requires attention to transportation, athletics, and family schedules. District planners could examine bus routes, negotiate practice times with neighboring schools, and publish revised schedules well before the change takes effect. These steps would address practical constraints without treating them as reasons to dismiss the proposal. In Seattle, public schools shifted secondary start times later in 2016, and researchers subsequently reported longer sleep duration among students at two participating high schools. That result does not prove that the same outcome would occur in every district, but it provides relevant evidence for a local pilot program.
- ③ Before adopting a districtwide revision, the board should authorize a one-year pilot at one high school and collect attendance, tardiness, course-performance, and transportation data. The evaluation should also include student and family surveys, because schedules affect households in different ways. A public report should compare the pilot school's results with its own prior-year data and identify any costs or service changes. If the evidence indicates meaningful benefits and manageable trade-offs, the board could consider expansion. This measured approach supports a defensible decision while acknowledging that scheduling policy involves competing community needs.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

The school should extend the phone-free instructional-day policy to all grades for one semester. During the six-week Grade 10 trial, teachers recorded 18 fewer classroom removals than during the previous six weeks, while the average assignment-completion rate rose from 82 percent to 88 percent. These figures do not establish that the policy alone caused both changes, because other classroom conditions may have differed. Therefore, administrators should collect comparable data across grades and survey students about emergency communication procedures. A semester-long implementation with a published evaluation would provide a sounder basis for a permanent decision.

Accept answers that accurately identify claims, qualifications, evidence, and formal policy conventions from the passage. For the writing task, accept varied recommendations if they use the provided data accurately, maintain an objective tone, include a limitation, and propose an evaluative next step.
