The Records Room

- ① At 8:40 p.m., Mara locked the small museum's front doors and began her final round. Rain tapped the skylight above the fossil hall, while the building's old pipes clicked behind the walls. Near the loading dock, she noticed a narrow strip of light under the records-room door. The room should have been empty. Mara checked the sign-out board, then saw that the curator's name was missing from its usual line. Instead of calling out, she took the flashlight from her belt and listened. A soft scrape sounded once, then stopped.
- ② She moved toward the door, counting each step to keep her shoes from squeaking. Before she reached it, her phone vibrated with a message from the curator: "I left ten minutes ago. Did you?" Mara stared at the screen. The light beneath the door vanished. For a moment, the hallway held only the rain and the ticking wall clock. Then the records-room handle turned slowly from the inside. Mara stepped behind a display case, but her flashlight slipped from her hand and rolled across the tile. Its beam stopped at the door, brightening the brass handle.
- ③ The door opened only a few inches. Mr. Vale, the night security guard, stood there holding a folder against his chest. "The alarm panel showed this room unlocked," he whispered. Mara recognized him, yet the scrape and the vanished light still made no sense. Together, they switched on the overhead lamp. A fallen metal drawer lay open beside the desk, and a gray cat crouched behind it, tangled in a string of inventory tags. Mara exhaled, then laughed quietly as Mr. Vale freed the cat. Outside, the rain softened. Mara returned the flashlight to her belt and finished her round, this time with the cat following at her heels.

#	QUESTION	ANSWER
1	What three events in the first paragraph lead Mara to investigate the records room?	Mara sees light under the door, notices the curator's name is missing from the sign-out board, and hears a scrape inside the room.
2	How does the curator's text message increase suspense at that point in the sequence?	It confirms that the curator has already left, making the light and sounds in the supposedly empty room more mysterious.
3	What event delays Mara's discovery in the second paragraph, and how does that delay build tension?	Her flashlight slips and rolls across the tile. The delay leaves her exposed while its beam points at the door and the handle turns.
4	How does the final paragraph shift the tone from suspense to resolution? Use two details from the passage.	The overhead lamp reveals that a cat caused the noise by getting tangled in inventory tags, and Mara laughs as Mr. Vale frees it. The softened rain and cat following Mara also create a calmer ending.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

At dawn, I entered the school greenhouse to water the seedlings. A wet trail crossed the concrete floor and ended beneath the storage bench. I set down the hose, but a pot clattered behind the ferns. I followed the trail slowly, stopping when the glass roof groaned in the wind. Another clatter came from the far corner, then silence. I reached for the bench handle and heard a faint, rapid scratching underneath it. When I lifted the bench, a soaked puppy backed against a bag of soil. Its collar tag named a family from the next street. I wrapped it in my jacket, called the number, and watched its tail begin to wag. Minutes later, its owner arrived, crying with relief. The wind still rattled the roof, but the greenhouse felt warm again.

For the writing task, accept varied subjects and outcomes if the response is 120 to 150 words, has three paragraphs, and uses a logical sequence that builds and resolves suspense.
