How Bees Help Flowers

- ① Bees visit flowers for food, but their trips also help plants make seeds. A bee drinks sweet nectar with its long tongue. It also picks up yellow pollen on its fuzzy body. When the bee lands on another flower of the same kind, some pollen rubs off. This move is called pollination, and it helps many plants grow fruit.
- ② Flowers use pollen to make seeds, yet pollen cannot travel by itself. Bees carry it as they move from bloom to bloom. In fact, bees are important pollinators for foods such as apples, blueberries, and pumpkins. Wind and other animals can pollinate plants too. However, bees visit many flowers, so they often move pollen where it needs to go.
- ③ Pollination matters because it begins the growth of new seeds. Those seeds can become plants that give people food. Bees also collect nectar to take back to their hive, where they make honey. Protecting bees helps gardens and farms. People can plant bee-friendly flowers and avoid harming bees when they are gathering food from flowers.

Sea Otters Help Kelp Forests Sea otters are marine mammals that live along some rocky coasts. They help kelp forests, which are underwater areas filled with tall brown seaweed. An otter's work begins when it searches for food. Sea otters eat sea urchins. Without otters, too many urchins can eat the kelp's holdfasts, the parts that anchor kelp to rocks. As a result, less kelp may grow. When otters keep urchin numbers lower, kelp has a better chance to grow. Kelp forests provide shelter and food for many ocean animals. Therefore, sea otters can help more than themselves when they eat. Protecting coastal waters gives otters and kelp forests safer places to live.
