Following Monarchs

- ① Each fall, many monarch butterflies leave the northern United States and Canada. They fly south to mountain forests in central Mexico, where they spend the winter. In spring, they begin moving north again. No single monarch makes the whole round trip. The butterflies that return north are the children and grandchildren of those that flew south.
- ② To learn why monarchs travel, a student can use more than one source. A map from the National Park Service shows the butterflies' winter home in Mexico. A book by insect scientist Karen Oberhauser explains that monarch caterpillars eat milkweed plants. Comparing sources helps a researcher check facts and learn new details about the topic.
- ③ After reading sources, the student writes notes in her own words. Her notes say that monarchs need milkweed for caterpillars and nectar from flowers for adult butterflies. Then she groups the notes under headings, such as Food and Travel. A short report can explain how the facts fit together. It can also list the sources used at the end.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Research question: How do earthworms help garden soil? Sources: National Geographic Kids website and a school library nonfiction book about earthworms. Notes, Home: Earthworms live in damp soil. Food and Soil: They eat dead plant parts, and their tunnels let air and water move through soil. Mini-report: Earthworms live underground in damp soil. They eat dead plant parts. Their tunnels help air and water reach plant roots.

Accept answers that identify the monarch topic, the two named sources, and passage facts organized by a fitting heading. For Part 3, accept a clear research question, two reasonable sources, at least three accurate notes in two groups, and a three-sentence report based on the notes.
