How Bees Help Plants

- ① Bees are important pollinators, which means they help many flowering plants make seeds. When a bee visits a flower for nectar, pollen can stick to its fuzzy body. Then the bee may carry that pollen to another flower of the same kind. Because of this trip, the plant can make seeds that may grow into new plants.
- ② Flowers offer bees more than one useful food source. Nectar gives bees sugary energy for flying. Pollen also provides protein and other nutrients. For example, worker bees carry pollen back to the hive to feed young bees. Bees need water, too, because water helps cool the hive and can be mixed with honey for food.
- ③ People can help bees find food and safe places to rest. First, gardeners can plant groups of native flowers that bloom at different times. Another helpful choice is leaving a shallow dish of water with stones for bees to stand on. Also, people can avoid spraying pesticides on open flowers, because some pesticides can harm bees.
