Following the Monarchs

- ① Jada began a short research project with one question: How do monarch butterflies survive their yearly journey? She decided to investigate three aspects: their body changes, the route they travel, and the food they need. Before searching, Jada wrote these aspects in her notebook. This helped her choose facts that answered her question instead of collecting random details.
- ② First, Jada used a library book about insects to study body changes. Its diagrams showed that monarchs store fat as adults before their fall migration. Next, she used a migration map from Journey North, a citizen-science project. The map showed reports of monarch sightings as the butterflies moved south. Jada recorded the book title and the map website beside her notes.
- ③ For the food aspect, Jada read a state wildlife agency webpage. It explained that monarch caterpillars eat milkweed leaves, while adult monarchs drink nectar from many flowers. Jada compared this information with a photo she took of milkweed in a neighborhood garden. Her notes led to an answer: monarchs need energy, a travel route, and places with the right plants.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Research question: How do beavers change a stream habitat? Aspects: dams, homes, and food. Source notes: A National Park Service page explains that beaver dams slow water and create ponds; a National Geographic Kids article explains that beaver lodges can have underwater entrances; a Smithsonian National Zoo page explains that beavers eat bark, leaves, and water plants. Answer: Beavers change stream habitats by building dams that slow water and create ponds. Their lodges shelter them, and they eat plants near the water.

Accept equivalent wording for the passage answers when it includes the correct research question, aspects, sources, and facts. For Part 3, accept any focused question, three distinct aspects, facts connected to at least two trustworthy sources, and a brief answer that uses the gathered facts.
