Why Cities Need Trees

- ① City planners should protect and plant trees along streets and near schools. Trees do more than make a neighborhood look pleasant. Their leaves provide shade, which can keep sidewalks, playgrounds, and buildings cooler on hot days. In places with many paved surfaces, shade matters because pavement absorbs sunlight and releases heat. For this reason, trees can help cities feel more comfortable in summer.
- ② Trees also help manage rainwater. When rain hits bare pavement, it may rush into storm drains quickly and can contribute to flooding. Tree leaves and branches catch some rain first, and roots help water soak into soil. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency explains that trees can reduce stormwater runoff. This evidence supports the point that planting trees can help neighborhoods handle heavy rain.
- ③ Finally, trees can improve air quality, although they do not remove all pollution. Leaves take in carbon dioxide during photosynthesis, and they can trap some tiny particles from the air. These facts support the idea that trees offer health benefits. Together, the reasons about shade, rainwater, and air show why city tree programs are worth supporting.
