A Garden for Our School

- ① Our school should plant a small native garden beside the playground. Native plants are species that grow naturally in our region. This garden would give local insects a better place to find food. Many bees and butterflies use nectar from flowers, and caterpillars eat leaves from certain plants. A garden with several native species could support these animals during the school day.
- ② Second, native plants can be a practical choice for the garden. After native plants have established roots, many need less extra water than plants from wetter places. Their roots are adapted to local soil and weather. Using less water can lower the amount of watering the garden needs. Students could help mulch the beds, which helps soil hold moisture and reduces weeds.
- ③ Finally, the garden would make science lessons more direct. Instead of only reading about plant life cycles, students could observe buds, flowers, seeds, and visiting insects outdoors. They could record what they see in notebooks and compare observations across seasons. For these reasons, a native garden would help wildlife, conserve water, and give students a useful place to learn.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Our school should install a covered bike rack near the main entrance. First, a roof would keep bicycles drier during rain, so seats and handlebars would be easier to use. Second, placing the rack near the entrance would make it easier for riders to lock bicycles where adults can see them. Finally, a rack with spaces for many bicycles would keep bicycles from blocking sidewalks.
