Two Birds, One Pond

- ① At the edge of a pond, ducks and great blue herons use the same wetland in different ways. A wetland is land that stays covered or soaked with water for much of the year. Ducks often dabble, or tip forward to reach food near the surface. They eat seeds, water plants, insects, and small animals. Their broad, flat bills help them strain tiny food pieces from water.
- ② Great blue herons hunt in the shallow water or stand still along the shore. Their long legs keep much of their bodies above the water, while their long necks and sharp bills help them catch prey. Fish, frogs, crayfish, and insects are common foods for herons. A heron may wait quietly, then strike its bill forward quickly when a fish swims close.
- ③ These details show why one pond can support several kinds of birds. Ducks use their bills to collect food near the surface, while herons use sharp bills to catch moving prey. Both birds may eat insects, but ducks also eat water plants and seeds. When writers explain a topic, specific facts, definitions, and examples help readers picture how animals live.
