Why Cities Need Trees

- ① On a hot day, a city park can feel cooler than a nearby parking lot. Trees shade sidewalks and grass, so sunlight does not heat those surfaces as much. Their leaves also release water vapor, which can cool the air. Because many cities have more pavement than plants, planting and caring for trees can help neighborhoods handle summer heat.
- ② Trees can also make a neighborhood healthier and more welcoming. Their roots hold soil in place during heavy rain, and their branches can provide homes for birds and insects. A row of trees may lower energy use, too. When trees shade a building, people may need less air conditioning. These benefits grow when communities choose suitable trees and give young trees water.
- ③ City trees are more than decorations along a street. By cooling paved areas, helping manage rain, supporting wildlife, and reducing some energy use, they improve daily life in several ways. Planting the right trees and protecting them as they grow is a practical step communities can take. For these reasons, urban trees are an important part of building safer, healthier places to live.
