### Maya's Night Walk

- ① On Saturday evening, Maya carried a jar of glow paint to the community garden. The path beside the tomato beds was hard to see after sunset, and the garden club planned a night walk. Maya wanted to paint small rocks so visitors could follow the trail safely. Crickets chirped under the fence while she set the jar beside a watering can.
- ② First, she chose flat stones from a dry corner near the shed. She brushed off soil with an old towel and painted one bright stripe across each stone. As the paint dried, Maya lined the stones along the path, leaving a few steps between them. A cool breeze lifted the smell of basil, and silver clouds slid across the moon.
- ③ Then the first walkers arrived with flashlights tucked under their arms. They paused when the rocks began to glow like tiny green lanterns. Maya watched a little boy point from one shining stone to the next, and he reached the gate without stepping into the muddy grass. When the walk ended, Maya tucked the empty paint jar into her bag and smiled.
