Mina's Garden Morning

- ① On Saturday morning, Mina carried a bucket to the community garden. First, she checked the dry soil around the tomato plants. Because the sun had been hot all week, the leaves drooped near the ground. Next, Mina filled her bucket at the rain barrel. Before she poured, she looked for tiny seedlings that could be washed away.
- ② Afterward, she poured water slowly around each plant. Meanwhile, her brother Leo pulled weeds near the path. When Mina noticed a wilted plant, she called Leo over. Together, they loosened the soil with small hand tools. Then they added a thin layer of straw, so the soil would stay moist longer. At last, Mina returned the bucket to the rain barrel.
- ③ Later that afternoon, dark clouds moved across the sky. As the first drops fell, Mina and Leo hurried to the tool shed. Soon, rain soaked the garden beds. While they waited inside, they planned where to plant carrots next month. Finally, the clouds passed, and the garden glistened in the sunlight. The children walked home, knowing the tomatoes had a better chance to grow.
