Planting Day

- ① On Saturday morning, I carried a packet of sunflower seeds to the empty corner of our yard. The soil felt cool and crumbly between my fingers. I pushed a trowel into the ground, and its metal blade scraped against a small stone. A robin chirped from the fence while the sharp, earthy smell of dirt rose around me.
- ② I dropped three seeds into each shallow hole and covered them with a thin blanket of soil. Water splashed from the green can, darkening the ground into muddy circles. By noon, the sun warmed the back of my neck. I checked the spot twice that day, hoping tiny green shoots would soon poke through the brown surface.
- ③ A week later, I hurried outside after breakfast. Near the fence, two curved stems stood above the soil, each holding round leaves like small green spoons. Dew beads trembled on the leaves and soaked my fingertip when I touched one. I called my sister to look, and we knelt beside the new plants, smiling at their bright, fresh color.
